Welcome to Hemodialysis



You have made the decision to start in-center hemodialysis to treat your kidney disease. You have probably had to make many decisions lately and may be a little nervous. We hope we can help you understand a little bit more about hemodialysis. We are at your service and want to help you make this the best experience it can be.



The two main functions of healthy kidneys

are to remove fluid and clean the blood. The artificial kidney that is used during dialysis can do some of that for you.

- While on dialysis, we can give you medications to replace those things that your kidneys are no longer making.
- Dialysis does only a fraction of what your healthy kidneys did, so never skip or shorten a treatment.
- It may take weeks to start feeling better as your kidneys have not been working for a while.
- There are other options besides hemodialysis for kidney failure.

While receiving dialysis in our clinic you will:

- Be treated with respect and dignity.
- Be sitting in the recliner for the entire treatment.
- Be cared for by staff who are also caring for other patients around you.

Before treatment, you will:

- Be weighed.
- Wash your access.
- Have your blood pressure taken.
- Be assessed by a nurse.
- Have needles inserted.
- Have labs drawn as needed.
- Go through safety checks.



During treatment:

- The dietitian, social worker, or your physician may talk with you.
- The staff will check on you at least every 30 minutes.
- You may receive medications.

When your treatment is complete you:

- May have blood samples drawn.
- Will have your blood pressure checked.
- Will have your needles removed.
- Will be assessed again by the nurse.
- Will be weighed again.

Here is what some of the staff can do for you:

Nurses (RN, LPN)

- Provide direct patient care
- Communicate with your physicians
- Treat your symptoms
- Administer medications

Certified Patient Care Technicians (PCT, CHT)

- Perform machine set up and safety checks
- Monitor your vital signs and notify the nurses when something changes
- Start and stop dialysis treatments

Social Worker (MSW)

- Specializes in needs such as financial, family, transportation, insurance questions and options, counseling and mental health resources
- Helps you set and achieve goals

Registered Dietitian (RD)

- Reviews your lab work
- Discusses healthy eating choices
- Provides you with resources for supplements and education

Physicians (MD)

 Your kidney doctor is responsible for directing your dialysis care and making rounds in the clinic to see you regularly.

Please let the staff know if:

- You feel bad before, during, or after dialysis.
- You had any medical treatment since your last dialysis.
- You start or stop any new medications.
- You feel like your medications are causing side effects.
- You receive calls or letters about your current insurance, or have questions about insurance or supplements.
- You or a family member changes jobs, or start or stop working.
- You think you might be interested in kidney transplant or home dialysis.
- You are thinking about stopping dialysis.

Notify a staff person if you start experiencing any of the following:

Tingling Nausea / Vomiting
Back Pain Any body aches
Headache Light headedness

Bleeding Funny taste in your mouth

Cramping Chest pain

Sweating Shortness of breath

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
